- 9/13 Imperare sibi maximum imperium est, - To control one's self is the greatest power
- 9/14 Vitium est omnia credere, vitium nihil credere, - It is a mistake to believe everything, and a mistake to believe nothing
- 9/15 Finis a origine pendet, - The end depends/hangs on the beginning
