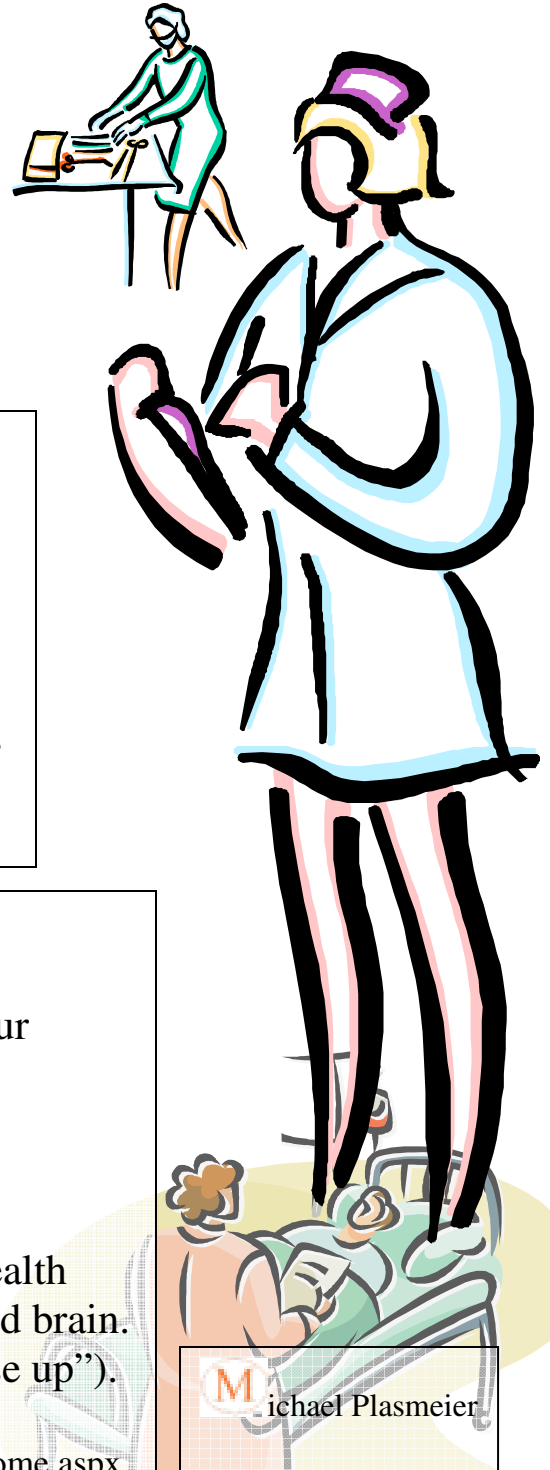


# Nurse

1. You fractured your *ulna*. (elbow; forearm).
2. Your hypokalemia (*kalium* “potassium”) is interfering with it’s sodium potassium (*potassa* “potash”) exchange of your arterial circulation of your cardiac system.
3. Metabolism of your pulmonary (from *pulmo* “lung”) system.
4. Sedentary (*sedentarius*, *sedere* “to sit”) lifestyle interferes with your metabolism.
5. Major obstacles (*obstare* “to stand in the way”) in the study of mental health with problems exist due to with defining the relative areas of the involved brain.
6. Your left peripheral arteries are occluded (From Latin *occludere* “to close up”).
